

WWII Royal Armored Corps Flashes

Editors Note: the photographs were not provided by Mr.
Starmer. They were provided as examples to help the reader.

The colors of WWII Royal Armored Corps (RAC) flash are those historically connected to the English armies of the 13th Century when a red cross on a white surcoat was adopted during the Crusades. English armies wore a red coat with white cross belts for centuries. During WWI, staff officers wore a red/white shoulder flash, and the first tanks were identified as friendly by these colors on them. However, there appears to have been a typo error somewhere in 1942 orders, and the RAC flash colors were reversed. Either no one noticed, or it was too late to change matters, or the predominance of red was less conspicuous against dull camouflage colors, it stayed until 1944.


The Red-White-Red Flash


The RAC flash was first introduced about March 1942 and was in widespread use by June of that year. This flash was to be of specified dimensions as set down in the 20th Armored Brigade "Standing Orders for War" dated July 1942 (TNA file WO166/6659):

Recognition Sign

This will be painted on the front, sides and rear of all tanks. It will NOT be painted on carriers or scout cars.

It will consist of RED - WHITE - RED vertical stripes, each stripe being 10" high and 6" wide.

From photographs it may be seen that this flash was most often painted as near as possible centrally on the tank front, along the sides and rear plates although the configuration of the tank influenced the exact location to some degree. On cruiser tanks like Covenanter and Crusader, the front marking

was often applied on the glacis plate near its lower edge towards one side where there was a central headlamp and the unit markings already took up the frontal plate and on later versions between the front lamps. On the sides the flash was painted on the side bins with its lower edge on the edge of the track guard. At the back of a Crusader, the marking was applied centrally to the top plate over the outlet grill or occasionally

on the auxiliary fuel tank.

On Churchill tank the flash was usually being painted either immediately in front of or behind the rectangular escape hatches or occasionally on them. On the front they were to one side of the tow shackle or on the glacis plate like the cruisers. Where an auxiliary fuel tank was carried the flash was often painted on this rather than the hull. The modeler is advised to look at photographs of the chosen subject for exact placement although these notes will help.

The specified size and locations were maintained for British, Commonwealth and Allied forces AFVs in the UK throughout the period of use till 1944. This marking was not to be applied to horizontal surfaces since it was not an air recognition sign. However, there is at least one exception in that at least one Dingo scout car of the Canadian forces at Dieppe did

carry this sign painted across the top of the engine deck at the rear edge.

When the units that later comprised 1st Army in Tunisia went overseas, their tanks carried this red-white-red RAC flash. This was intended solely as a means by which British infantry may identify friendly AFVs, no more.

The White-Red-White Flash

In early November 1941 whilst planning for "Operation Crusader", the relief of Tobruk, the issue of recognition of friendly AFVs for ground forces was again addressed. All participating armored units were ordered to mark their tanks with a large and distinctive easily recognized marking due to a number of factors first of which was a lamentable inability of both infantry and tank crews to recognize or identify our own tanks in clear conditions let alone the smoke, dust and confusing situations that were arising in

actions, the increasing use by both sides to use captured vehicles and in addition the introduction of a new type to the battlefield. An order from the GHQ of the 8th Army was issued about 5th November 1941 immediately applicable to all units designated to partake in the forthcoming operation which commenced on 18th November and continued until 6th January 1942. This order applied to units of both XII and XXX Corps and Tobruk Gar-

In addition to which I have copies of the pertinent sections of this order to 7th Armored Division, 6th Infantry Division and 32nd Army Tank Brigade. A typical example is below:

Adv. H.Q. 30 Corps. 7 Nov.

1. Ground to ground recognition of AFVs will be standardized throughout the EIGHTH ARMY on the following lines.

Tanks only. Sign to be painted

in positions shown on attached diagram, the sign to be 3 vertical bands, the centre band to be red, the outer bands to be white. Each band will be 6 inches wide and up to 18 inches deep according to available space. Paints and brushes are being sent immediately to Formation O.F.Ps. The sign will be painted on as soon as paint is received. Completion of all tanks will be reported to this H.Q.

In each case the designated positions were both sides of the turret, both sides of the front track-guards and one centrally on the front hull plate. These locations were indicated on a somewhat crude drawing attached to the above order, a copy of which is included here. No

carry two pennants in various positions as prescribed in the order on specified dates. There was a codeword issued as the instruction to adopt these pennant positions.

The orders specifically require not only tanks but armored OP vehicles, these were usually carriers or armored cars manned by forward observation officers (FOOs) of Royal Artillery units, and captured tanks on charge to the Polish Brigade. This last referred to at least three PzKpfw Ills with Polish forces. There is at least one photograph of these tanks so marked at a parade.

Photographs taken during Operation Crusader clearly show that the following types of British tank were marked was an old Morris A.C.9 probably belonging to a H.Q. of one of the armored regiments and some Marmon-Herrington cars of the reconnaissance units.

Generally all of the tanks conformed to the position instructions but there are oddities. One such is at least one A13 of 7th Hussars that carried the stripes on the forward facing areas of the front track guards instead of the sides of the track guards, the central front hull marking is not present. On many tanks it may be observed that quite often the flash painted on the sides of the trackguards was the correct width but ran the full height of the metal panel irrespective of the angled edges and height. In many cases too the front hull flash was the full height of the plate but correct width.

From photographs of the Stuarts of 4th Armored Brigade, these evidently carried a variation of sizes and location on their turrets. It may be seen that some displayed the correct size either on the central side turret plate or the foremost one to avoid the tactical marking already applied to the adjacent plate. In both locations it may also be a full height of the turret plate too. In the case of the well-known "Bellman" of the 8th King's Royal Irish Hussars, the flash had been painted over the pre-existing tactical red square of 'B' squadron and an attempt had then been made to scrub off those parts of the white areas that

marking was to be applied to the rear or horizontal surfaces; this was not an air recognition sign. This order was followed by item (b) regarding tanks and armored cars that were to

according to the instruction; a few A9s, and A10, slightly more A13 cruisers, Crusader I, Stuart I (M3A1 Honey), Valentine II, Matilda II and Vickers Light tank Mk.VI and AA version. In addition one

obscured the square. As an aside, the name "Bellman" had been painted in white on the original Olive Drab No.9 on both sides toward the top edge of the front turret side plate and masked off in the same manner as the WD number when the British camouflage scheme was applied after issue to the unit. On these Stuarts the flash on the front plate has generally been painted centrally beneath the metal strip step fitted to the hull front but there are cases where it has been moved to one side in narrower form to make application easier. This offset feature can be seen on some

Valentines of 8th R.T.R. although these are usually full width and the height of the front plate.

In addition to AFVs carrying the well known but often inaccurately depicted three colored "Caunter" patterning so evident on the greater majority of vehicles during "Operation Crusader", you will also see the flash marked on Stuart, Crusader and Valentine tanks that are a single overall color. These were new issue reinforcement vehicles hurriedly brought forward in an attempt to make up combat losses, there being insufficient time to apply the full

disruptive pattern although in December 1941 this scheme had been cancelled in favor of a single color only.

Following the successful end of the operation in January, albeit with huge losses of tanks and equipment, the white-red-white marking was cancelled and presumably units were ordered to paint over them. No order has yet been found instructing units to obscure or remove the marking but there are a number of photographs taken in early 1942 of different types of tanks that do show fresh camouflage colored rectangles of paint over those areas where the flash would have been applied. This flash was never used again anywhere in the Middle East on any other type of tank or other vehicle than those listed above.
