As with "zee" Germans' constant tweaking with their Panzers, the Sherman tank went through numerous modifications and enhancements as well. Each subtype can also be traced back to a particular factory building for a specific purpose and user. One can argue a modeler will have no trouble modeling nothing but Sherman's for his entire life!



<u>Introduction</u>

This was my first review for the AMPS website and I have been lucky enough to draw the **tasca** British Army Sherman III Direct Vision Type (w/Early "VVSS" Suspension). The kit is 1:35th scale and is **tasca's** 8th of 9 Sherman tank kits to be released by them. If you have not built one, yet you are in for a treat.

tasca 1:35th scale Sherman Kits:

35-009 - British Sherman VC Firefly

35-010 - U.S. Medium Tank M4A1 Sherman (Mid Production)

35-011 - British Sherman VC Firefly with cast check-armor turret

35-012 - U.S. Medium Tank M4A1 Sherman (Late Production)

35-014 - British Army Sherman II Direct Vision Type (El Alamein 1942)

35-016 - British Army Sherman V (M4A4)

35-L27 - U.S. Medium Tank M4A1 Sherman Direct Vision Type - Limited Edition

35-017 - British Army Sherman III Direct Vision Type (w/Early "VVSS" Suspension)

35-L28 - British Army Sherman III Direct Vision Type (w/Initial "VVSS" Suspension) - Limited Edition

These kits are considered the best Sherman kits on the market with the **Dragon/DML** kits coming in a close second. I now own five out of the nine **tasca** Sherman kits.

This kit is almost the same kit as the 1:35th scale British Army Sherman III Direct Vision Type (w/Initial "VVSS" Suspension) 35-L28 (Limited Edition). Two very nice reviews of this kit by **Roy Chow** can be found on the AMPS website *http://www.amps-armor.org*.

"DOING A QUICK **REVIEW OF THE SPRUES** I DON'T SEE ANY FLASH. THERE ARE INJECTOR PIN MARKS **BUT THEY ARE ON THE** INSIDE OF PARTS THAT YOU ARE NOT SUPPOSED TO SEE. THERE ARE THREE FAINT INJECTOR PIN MARKS ON THE COMMANDER'S HATCH. HOWEVER, THESE ARE LIGHT MARKS AND CAN BE **EASILY FIXED IN** SECONDS WITH A

SANDING STICK."

Doing a quick look at the sprues I don't see any flash. There are injector pin marks but they are on the inside of parts that you are not supposed to see. There are three faint injector pin marks on the commander's hatch. However, these are light marks and fixed easily in seconds with a sanding stick.

The tracks are 2 part vinyl pieces that need to be cemented together. These tracks represent the T51 block tracks used on the early Sherman tanks. The tracks are fine and go well with the


subject. Personally, I would like to have seen tasca provide WE210 "Double I" pattern tracks. Dragon did provide their Dragon Styrene (DS) WE210 "Double I" pattern tracks in their Sherman MK III "Sicily" kit. Again, that is my preference and it should not take away from the

review of the kit.

As mentioned the primary difference of the tasca 35-017 kit and the 35-L28 kit are the suspension arm assemblies. The 35-L28 kit has the initial "VVSS" suspension assembly and the 35-017 kit has the early "VVSS" suspension assembly.





Instructions

The instructions are well done (I will comment on them more thoroughly in my build review). The instruction sheets overall have 20 sections with several sections having additional steps. Instructions are in Chinese, Japanese, Korean, and English. Thank goodness I can read English!

Paint Schemes and Decal Placement links

tasca provides a two-fold handout that contains instructions on how to build the Suspension Arm Assembly and painting instructions for the commander figure as well as the vehicle camouflage and decal placement. tasca provides very nice links to color images of the vehicle camouflage and decal placement in PDF files on their website. Color plates with decal placement for three different vehicles are provided. Here are the two links for the Sherman III Direct Vision Type (w/Early "VVSS" Suspension):

As mentioned above there are decals for three different units / vehicles.




