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Club Meeting Place



In the last few years I have used my home scanner to capture and preserve many family photos and papers. Among all these papers I have found some information related to the military service of my ancestors. This process is like finding the pieces of a puzzle. Sometimes you find enough pieces to make a picture but sometimes you are just left with information out of context.

I have been lucky in that my Dad admired his Uncles that had served in WW1 and being a child of the depression he kept things many people would have thrown away.

You realize, of course, that I, as a part of the legislative branch of the government, have no control over decisions reached by the officials of the Army who will pass upon your application. I can, though tell the Commanding Officer with whom you file your request that I am particularly interested in helping you, and that I will appreciate every consideration given you.

If you will let me know when you have filed your application, and if possible the name of the officerwho will handle it, I shall be very pleased to recommend you to him and do everything I can to be helpful.

I am glad you wrote me as you did and you know that I am happy to have this opportunity to endeavor to be of assistance to you.



I found one letter in my Grandmother's cedar chest. I think my Dad sent it to her to keep and that no one had looked at it for 62 years when I picked it up. In October 1943 Dad had written his Congressman about transferring from quartermaster to Air Corp. The Congressman's assistant, future President Lyndon Baines Johnson replied and signed the letter.

One artifact is a small card about as big as a credit card. It was a two day pass to the recreation center in Coblenz issued by VII Army Corps. It was from March of 1919, signed by the commander of the 360th infantry machine gun company and the back has barrack names and reporting instructions. That is a lot of information packed into a very small item. At first I thought this might be the infamous concentration camp location but that was in Poland. I believe this is the city on the Rhine near the Moselle.

Newspapers covered what we would consider very small incidents. I have two separate clippings one marked my Dad visiting his mom and my Uncle completing his training. Both have a picture, complete rank, base and unit information. The article on my Dad was just 11 lines but it contained a lot of information. He was a Pvt., stationed at Fort Francis E. Warren WY., in the Quartermaster Corps and was visiting his mom. Gave her address. Said he was a Grad of the Masonic Home and UT and his brother is a second class petty officer overseas. Any bit of information can lead to a trail of investigation. Based on that I found a Wikipedia article about Fort

Francis. (http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Fort D.A. Russell (Wyoming)). The article on my Uncle sites him as an aviation ordinance mate and about to finish training Dahlgren, VA naval proving grounds.

Using this website of Military Medals I was able to find the citation for my Great Uncle. (http://www.militarytimes.com/citations-medals-awards/search.php?medal=2) My Dad had read me this when I was a small boy but I had not been able to find it or any other description as an adult. The site gives a good amount of detail:

*BOURLAND, WILLIAM P.
First Lieutenant, U.S. Army
Company C, 1st Engineers, 1st Division, A.E.F.
Date of Action: October 8 - 9, 1918
Citation:

The Distinguished Service Cross is presented to William P. Bourland, First Lieutenant, U.S. Army, for extraordinary heroism in action near Verdun, France, October 8 - 9, 1918. On October 8, leading his company to the assault of a hill, First Lieutenant Bourland captured many prisoners and machine guns. On October 9, while defending the hill, the enemy launched a counterattack of greatly superior numbers, but, in the face of great danger, Lieutenant Bourland proceeded to an outpost, and by skillful direction he contributed greatly to the successful defense of the hill. He was killed while in command at this outpost.

General Orders No. 27, W.D., 1919 Home Town: Rock Springs, TX

Newspapers wrote differently too. My great Uncle was killed in Action, the first sentence of that clipping reads, "The grim destroyer War has claimed another former Llano boy."

I have my Grandmother's sugar rationing coupon from 1942. It is often easy to overlook the home front.

I have my Uncle's driver permit issues in April 1944. It confirms he was still based at the Naval base at Guantanamo, Cuba. My Uncle never spoke about his time in the service. He never said so much as, "Boy, Cuba was hot." He was so silent that his wife made up stories to explain his reticence; they were all crap.

Of all the things I found my favorite is a simple one page set of orders. My Dad had always told me the story of how he got to see my Uncle on this way to Trinidad. He had gotten a letter from him before they started using the APO system so he knew Uncle Bill was stationed in Guantanamo Bay. Dad told me he asked the Chaplin on ship to radio the base and make ask permission as soon as he learned they would stop there. I found the orders that gave my Uncle permission to board the ship. That one item told me Uncle Bill's unit was the Fleet Air Wing 11 Flying PBY's and Dad's ship taking him to Trinidad was the Light Carrier USS Monterey on its shakedown cruise.

KILLED IN ACTION

The grim destroyer War has claimed another former Llano boy. Mrs. Jessie Newsom of Rock Springs received a message last week telling of the death of her son, Lieut. W. F. Bourland which occurred on October 9th while in action.

Lieut. Bourland was 27 or 28 years of age. He graduated from the Llano High School with the Class of 1910, following which he went to A. & M. College and completed the course in engineering.


When it appeared that his Nation was on the verge of war, young Bourland volunteered and afterwards entered the officers' training camp at Leon Springs where he was commissioned. He soon went to France where he served faithfully until the time of his death.

Licut. Bourland was reared in the Valley Spring neighborhood. He was a nephew of our fellow townsman M. B. Dabbs. He was one of those fellows whose ambition carried him on to greater things. He was not satisfied with anything but the best. His constant aim was to equip himself for a life of usefulness.

His friends who speak of him say he was one of the finest of fellows. He was a true friend and a devoted son. He was considerate of his widowed mother and endeavored always to bring to her life those things which contributed to her comfort and pleas-

But the demon War has claimed its toll again. The grief-stricken mother has been called upon to make the sacrifice. In her affliction the sympathy of our people go to her with the fervent prayer that a Divine Providence will watch over and sustain her in this sad hour.
