
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Austin Armor Builders Society Membership Dues

Club Meeting Place



German 39(H) 10.5cm LeFH18(Sf) auf Geschutzwagen

<u>History</u>

The German Army made good use of captured enemy armor as the basis of many different vehicles. Following the fall of France, the French Light Hotchkiss H39 tank had a proven, reliable chassis and thus became a candidate for modification into a self-propelled artillery piece. Of the 72 H39's captured, some twenty-four were converted to use the 7.5cm PAK40 (anti-tank gun 1940), while the rest carried the 10.5cm leFH18 (light field howitzer model 1918). The combination of the large 10.5cm gun with the light Hotchkiss H39 results in an ungainly looking vehicle. The tall superstructure overhangs the hull quite a bit.

All were assigned to the 155 Artillerie Rgt under command of the 21st Panzer Division in Normandy. They saw much action in the weeks after D-Day.


<u>The Kit</u>

The Trumpeter kit (no.00353) consists of 214 tan plastic parts on 4 sprues labeled A, E, F, and G, 2 vinyl tracks, 3 Balkan Cross decals, and instructions.

Getting Started

Upon inspection, there were numerous punch marks to be filled, most notably on the interior armored sides. I used a combination of glazing putty, liquid cement, and enamel paint as fillers. After wet sanding, the end results are quite satisfactory.

I decided to tackle this project in 3 assemblies: the hull and wheels, the superstructure, and the gun. The hull construction was fairly easy. The only problem was that the joints where the drive bodies mated to the hull had to be filled as period photos showed these areas to be cast in one piece with the nose.



I was extra careful the ensure that the road wheels were on line and fit flush to the table. The attachment points of the wheels is weak so I over-glued those areas and periodically checked alignment as the cement dried.

On the rear of the hull there are 2 objects to attach. These are shown in Section 4 of the instruction sheet as parts 'B2'. This is an error. The correct parts are 'G36'

as shown in Section 20. The hull carries a bare bones interior with transmission, driveshaft, and driver's seat.

The gun assembly is pretty easy and the fit is good. There is a noticeable gap where the breech assembly joins with the barrel. The breech opening arm is missing the handle. I fashioned one out of stretched sprue. At this point, I could have opted to add a turned metal barrel. I decided to use the kit's plastic barrel and brake as the quality of the kit did not warrant the extra expense.

The superstructure needed some hand fitting in order to figure out the instructions. There are no locating pins. I got it together by sheer luck. There were open gaps on the seams where the sides meet the back. Everything else in the assembly is exactly described. I did not install the radio or ammunition racks at this time. I wanted to paint them separately.

1st Painting

The major assemblies were given a primer coat of Flat Black. This was to give a dark base for the subsequent color sprays, The black also showed places that needed more filling and sanding. Next came a coating of Tamiya Khaki XF49, sort of a dark shade of the main color Tamiya Dark Yellow XF60. This was sprayed on in a cloud pattern on the main panel surfaces so that the sharp corners would stand out. The hull was painted khaki inside and out as well as the gun.



Next the hull interior was sprayed with future to protect the paint before a wash of rusty black artist oils was applied. I decided to put some mud on this vehicle. I gathered some dry dirt from my yard and pulverized it in a porcelain cup. After carefully painting diluted white glue onto the wheels, hull sides, and underneath the fenders, I sprinkled on the fine dirt and let it all dry. I knocked of some of the dirt with a stiff toothbrush where it looked to be too heavy. I was happy with the mud.



The major components were over-sprayed with the Dark Yellow, again in a cloud pattern. The hull was only painted with this color on the exterior, wheels, etc. I wanted the interior darker than the rest of the vehicle.

2nd Painting

Prior to this step, I cemented the superstructure to the hull. This step had me adding the transmission cover too. I had to add a shim of plastic card behind the cover as the fit was terrible. Next I had to fill any gaps. Once complete, the painting could begin.

I painted the front end with the Dark Yellow, covering the unpainted transmission cover. Upon drying, the whole exterior and the gun were sprayed with the Tamiya Field Grey XF65 in sweeping strokes.



The whole exterior was they sprayed with Future and then the decals were added. The decals had a slight registration offset which I did not notice until they were on the model. The muzzle brake on the gun was blackened. This was achieved by holding a burning sprue near the brake, The smoke produced was enough to do the job. Care must be exercised so the flame doesn't melt the muzzle brake.

<u>Weathering</u>

I speckled the kit with random spots of artist Burnt Umber oil paint. The spots were pulled downward with a wide brush saturated with mineral spirit. The spots soon began to appear as rust streaks. I probably overdid the affect. Next came a dark pin wash around the raised details of the exterior, rivets, hinges, etc. The interior was also given a general wash.

Paint chips were simulated by application of tiny black spots with a tiny brush. Once again I probably overdid the affect as these vehicles did not see much action. The rivet heads, hinges, etc. were highlighted with the Dark Yellow.

The wheels were given a wash of black. The wheel rims and track contact points were given a silver highlight. The mud was dry brushed to raise the detail. Finally, the tools and taillight were painted.

<u>The Tracks</u>

The vinyl tracks were put together according to Section 1 of the instructions. They turn out to be way too loose. I tried to shorten them by removing links and using thin wire as a connector. It did not look good. At some point in the future, I may buy a set of individual track links (Hobbyboss 81003).





Conclusion

This Trumpeter kit (00353) is sub-par. I would not recommend the kit to anyone except beginners. It omits much detail and the tracks are a bad joke. The snail drums for the MG34 are very bad. I left them off until I can find the Tamiya German Weapons Set, which has nice drums.

For those interested in this vehicle, there is a better kit. It's the Bronco #35005.

2011 Christmas Party





AMPS Centex 2011- My thoughts

This isn't the official AMPS Centex report. I will let our President and Show Coordinator **Eric Choy** speak to that. However, I will give you all some facts on how this show compares to our previous shows. Again, some of this is backed up by facts and numbers and the other is my personal opinion.

Why do we put on a show? Here are my opinions:

- To compete against yourself against an International judging standard.
- To enjoy comradeship with fellow armor and figure modelers.
- To represent your Club to the rest of the modeling community in our area.
- To have FUN! This is the most important one in my opinion and it ties into comradeship.

So how did we do on these four points? I think we did very well.

<u>Judging</u>

Judging was done using the AMPS Judging System. We have come a long way with this. I was pleased with the overall judging effort and I want to thank all the judges who helped out with the judging. However, there are several points where we need to improve on:

- 1. We need a RamRod to enforce the rules, double check the judging table scores and comments, etc. The chief judge can't always be in the judging pit. There were several teams that didn't put down feedback comments. Modelers love to get feedback. The feedback needs to be helpful. Saying that "You did a nice job on this kit" and the modeler's overall score doesn't reflect that; then there will be questions. Positive comments are always welcomed but make them specific. Point out where the modeler needs to improve but do it in a constructive way. With constructive feedback the modeler will improve.
- 2. I overheard several "Experts" saying it was never like this or they should have used this color because the one on this vehicle isn't the correct shade. This is where the RamRod would step in and remind the team on what the judging criteria is.
- 3. Also, while scoring the scores, I noticed that there was a wide range in scores between the judges on a given model. For example, All the way from a 9.0 to a 5.5. As a judging team you should always look at why there is such a huge discrepancy between the judges score. If they are off by .5 or a point then that is acceptable. But 3.5 range isn't' and it needs to be addressed by the table team lead OR the RamRod.

Again, I want to thank **Bob Bethea** and **Eric Choy** for getting the Judging off on a good foot. The AMPS Chief Judge (**Mike Petty**) will be coming to Texas in the near future to help certify more of us as judges.

<u>Comradeship</u>

Well, I saw a lot of people having fun and enjoying themselves. Seeing old friends and making new friends. This is one of the reasons why people come to shows. I enjoyed talking with other modelers, vendors, and even some pretty ladies (Thanks **Eric**). Personally, I had a very enjoyable time and I hope you did as well.

If you didn't, I would like to hear from you at the club meeting. Again, feedback is important.

AMPS Centex Reputation

This is hard to gauge. So let's look at the involvement of club members at the AMPS Centex 2011 show. We have 30 paid members. We only had 17 members participate at the AMPS Centex show by being a Contestant, Vendor, Judging, being a runner, or doing other show activities. That is more than 50% participation but we about 75% of the members vote to have a show. So around 25% of the members that voted for the show didn't show up. I am disappointed by that. If you vote to have a show, be there at the show. Support the show and your club! I think we need to determine the reasons why we can't get more club members to participate at the show.

The majority of the modelers were from Texas though we did have a very small contingent from Oklahoma. We had a large contingent of Houston and San Antonio modelers come to our show. I thank them and we should try to attend their local shows as well.

Having Fun!

As mentioned above I had fun and I saw a lot of people having fun. I think we passed this. I

would have liked more members to be there but we can work on that for the next show.

<u>Highlights</u>

- <u>The Venue</u>. I think we finally have found a home for our show. Yes, it is the most expensive venue we have had to date but it was well worth the expense. The rooms, the lighting, and the overall layout flowed very well. Thanks to **Eric Choy** for finding the venue.
- <u>Master of Ceremonies</u>: Bob Bethea did such a wonderful job with awards ceremony that I would like to make him permanent MC! Bob was able to handle the crowd and actually was able to joke back and forth with them. The crowd appreciated it even when we were having some difficulties he was able to make them seem trivial.

<u>Lowlights</u>

- The cost of the show. We knew that we wouldn't make money on the show. We will just have to do better fund raising in the future to offset the costs.
- Lower turnout in models and participants. We need to market the show in different ways so we can get more people to come to the show.

<u>Medals</u>

Our best show for entries was our first show in 2001. We came close to matching the entries highmark in 2003 but have been way down since 2003. The three previous shows (2005, 2007, 2011) we were seeing a slight increase show over show until this year but it is still in the range of entries for our last three shows.

This was also our second lowest number of medals awarded; only the 2005 show had less medals awarded. I think the primary reason for the lower medals awarded is that we are getting better at AMPS Judging.

The average models per entrant for our show was 3.89 models. This is better than the 3.74 average in 2001 and 2009. There were fewer modelers and models but you had most model-

ers bring quite a few models to the show.


I should have the photographs of each model on the website by the meeting.
