
We meet at the Austin Public Library - Old Quarry Branch.

### How to publish your Sabot Away! Articles

The newsletter (Sabot Away!) is only as good as the articles we get from our members. We are going through a dry spell these past few years of people writing articles and have had to resort to drafting people to write articles. Like I said a few years ago, if the articles stop coming then the newsletter will stop being created.

We are getting to that point once again. At the next couple of meetings I will be asking people to commit to writing an article for the newsletter and assign them a month to guarantee at least one article per newsletter. Our goal is three articles per newsletter but two is ok and one is the bare minimum or the newsletter doesn't go out that month.

2008 was the last time we missed publishing a monthly issue. We published 11 out 12 months that year and haven't missed a month since. So we have been holding our own. As mentioned above, I am not getting the number of articles I have received in the past. Just because someone is scheduled to write an article for a given month doesn't mean that you can't send in an article. It can be used that month or in the following months.

Writing articles is really an easy thing to do. If you are already posting images and descriptions of your work on websites then you are more that halfway there. I know of several members of the club that actually have modeling blogs and I follow them and their work. It would be very easy to take that experience and apply it to a newsletter (Sabot Away!) article.

Others have explained to me that they don't have a camera or just can't take good photographs of their work. We have several excellent photographers in our club that would be willing to take photographs of your work as you progress through the build or of your completed work. All you have to do is ask.

If you do have photographs, then how can you get them to me? Email can work but could take you multiple emails to get them to me. The best option is to burn a CD and send it to me either via snail mail or hand it to me at a meeting. If you have tons of photos or very large photographs we can grant access to a shared server (**Dropbox**) for you to upload.

Articles can be handwritten, typed via an email, typed on paper, captured in a word processor (MS Word is preferred) file. Articles do not have to have photographs. Please submit content that is unique and has not been published online or in other publications. I can and do edit text for correct grammar, spelling and clarity.

The larger the size of the photograph the better. It gives me more wiggle room to size it as needed without compromising picture quality. If you have captions for your photos please make sure that the caption is matched to the photo by name and or number and reference the photo in the text of the document so I know where it is supposed to go.

#### What are we looking for:

- Model Build Reviews
- How-to Guides
- Vehicle References
- ♦ Historical/Narrative

It is up to you how you want to write. Make it easy on yourself and write an article that you are interested in.

#### Images:

We have touched on them briefly above. Here are the type of images needed:

## How to publish your Sabot Away! Articles - Continued

- In-progress build photographs
- Finished build photographs
- Take some images with the camera posed at fender level with the model. These images make good article cover shots.
- JPG format or TIFF format is preferred. Other formats are acceptable.
- Provide RAW image if possible with no resizing, cropping, color edits. Leave captions off as well.
- Use largest resolution on your camera
- Use a light-colored backdrop behind the model instead of your workbench. A smooth backdrop is preferred.
- Use a tripod when you shoot your images
- Use the built-in timer so no hands are on the camera when it captures a image (this prevents last second movements that can ruin the shot).
- Know your camera. Read the instructions and know how to use the camera. Find out how to adjust settings for an ISO number of 100 and high aperture or f-stop greater than 12.0 if possible. If your camera has a macro setting, please use it.
- Please provide many poses from all angles. Zoom into sections of the model that deserve the attention.
- Provide multiple poses where the whole mode is within the picture (including the gun barrel). These type of poses are good front article pictures.
- If you need additional camera help, please ask. We can get you the help you need.

#### Text of the Article

- As mentioned above we prefer digital word processor file (MS Word) but will take email, plain text file, typed pages, and handwritten pages. Almost anything is welcomed.
- No need to worry about formatting. Format will be changed to fit the newsletter style.
- Provide history of the subject, if possible.
- Image captions; please make them descriptive and make sure they match the given photograph.
- Provide a list of aftermarket additions, if you used any.
- Provide a list of reference materials used.

Always send more photographs and text than you think is needed. I will select images according to what works best for the newsletter layout.

Here is a sample outline to structure your article:

- 1. Introduction: Describe the subject's history. Any historical significance or interesting deployment / production information is a bonus.
- 2. Kit Description: What is in the box and what options are provided? Determine the parts quality regarding detail and flaws.
- 3. Construction: Describe the building process steps you used and why. Mention any alterations

to the kit, why you did them and most importantly, how you did them. Mention complications encountered and inaccuracies identified. Include mention of clear, resin and metal parts that are part of the kit or aftermarket items added.

- 4. **Paint and Finish**: Mention the overall scheme and its historical context. Name the products used by manufacturer and specific name. Include marking choices and methods used to apply them. Describe weathering techniques used with descriptive details that teach the reader.
- 5. **Conclusion**: Did the model meet your expectations? Is it a good value for the cost? Was it enjoyable (or not) to build? How does it compare to other kits like it (if any). Would you recommend it to others?
- 6. References / Resources: List references used to help you build the model, including websites. List aftermarket products used, by manufacturer and name, if any.

Remember that our club is largely what its members make of it, and that is true with Sabot Away! Please help the make the newsletter a great value to our fellow members. I would like to thank John Robinson (Boresight Lead Editor), Matt Deck (Boresight Editor), and our very own Eric Choy (Boresight Editor) for their input to this article as well as the AMPS Website. The web site that we had consulted while planning our April trip didn't nearly show how big the collections are. There are dozens of displays outdoors including aircraft, tanks and artillery as well as maintenance and support equipment. Indoors there are several thousand square feet of exhibits,




