
#### July 2, 2014



### The National Museum of the United States Marine Corps by Roderick Bell

#### INTRODUCTION

In April 2014, Russ Holm, Eric Choy, and I attended the AMPS 2014 International Conference in Fredericksburg, Virginia. After attending the three day show we took an additional day for site seeing before we drove back to the Great State of Texas.

Our first stop was **The National Museum of the Marine Corps** located at 18900 Jefferson Davis Highway, Triangle, Virginia 22172. The first thing you see when passing by on IH-95 is the 210 foot stainless steel spire soaring over the tree line. The museum is on 135 acres adjacent to the Marine Corps Base Quantico. The museum itself is 118,000 square feet and there are plans to expand it to 181,000 square feet when funds are raised.

The museum was designed by the architectural firm Fentress Bradburn Architects. The design of the museum emulates the image of the raising of the

American flag over Iwo Jima. This is a truly a magnificent museum. The Globe and Anchor are present throughout the museum. These lined the walkway coming into the museum.



#### **EXHIBITS**

The museum has two floors (decks). We will begin with the first deck. When you walk into the museum and get pass the security check (The Marine guards carry .45 cal. Pistols), you will come into the first Gallery. This gallery is known as the Leatherneck Gallery.

The following content contains aircraft photographs. You die hard tread heads please cover your eyes.



This gallery extends to the top of the building with several aircraft being suspended from the roof. These aircraft include the Marine Corps AV-8 Harrier, The Corsair, a UAV, and a biplane. Also, there is a very realistic 1:1 scale diorama of the World War II Battle of Tarawa with a beached LVT-1 and Marines fighting against the coconut seawall.

There is also a 1:1 scale Korean War Helicopter diorama of Marines dislodging from the helicopter onto the battlefield. You have to give it to the Marines, they go all out on these 1:1 scale dioramas.

Another 1/35<sup>th</sup> Soviet paper panzer from Takom: multi-turret KV-5 heavy tank.




