

do better with my white elephant in 2016 than I did in 2015.

Continuing to follow the British offensive in North Africa seventy-five years ago this month, I found an armor battle that shows the Italian armor forces were not completely over matched. While the Italians retreated from Tobruk, one motorized force including M13/40's was placed on the desert flank near Mechili. As the British  $7^{\text{th}}$  armored division came upon this location, the Italians engaged the leading British Mk.VI tanks and destroyed six of them. The British retreated, and to counter the pursuing Italians, Cruiser tanks and artillery were brought up to ambush the M13/40's.


The result was nine Italian tanks destroyed while only a single Cruiser was lost, but the Italians remained in control of the road junction that was the British objective at Mechili.

## Scale Model Camouflage Netting

build a lot of  $1/35^{\text{th}}$  scale modern armor kits. It's hard to find an M1 Abrams or Leopard on maneuvers without some kind of camouflage netting draped across the hull or barrel to break up the distinctive shape of an AFV.



This is my way of creating camouflage nets. It's adapted from Francois Verlinden's method. Materials needed:

- Cheese cloth or white medical bandage
- Paints (Enamel and Acrylic)
- SOBO or Elmer's white glue
- Tea bags

Cut up random shapes of cheesecloth. These will be soaked in a thinned acrylic color wash to give them color. I use Tamiya XF-49 Khaki as a base. You can also use a beige or sand color as the base depending on what type of net you're trying to depict.





Once the nets have picked up the color I transfer them to a paper towel to let them dry. When the nets are dry they should look like this. You'll notice I have done some strip camouflage also.





These are strips of Viva paper towels that I have soaked in the color wash and then let dry. You'll see the strip camouflage on most Leopard 2's in the field.

Once the nets have dried I soak them once more in a solution of white glue and water. I use SOBO but any white glue will do. Once they're soaked in the white glue solution I drape them over the vehicle. I try to drape them using reference pictures of real tanks. The vehicle should be completely painted before adding the camouflage netting. Don't worry about the glue solution getting on the tank as it will dry completely clear.



I am using the nets on a Meng Leopard 1A5.



Next add tea leaves to the still wet nets. The tea leaves simulate the leaves on the net. I try to get different types of tea to vary the shape of the

leaves on the net. After the nets have dried. I usually give it over night to be sure before I start painting on them.





Once dry I paint them up with an Olive drab or burnt umber color, then dry brush with a lighter green or brown. I usually use Humbrol colors to paint the nets but acrylics would do just as well.



The last step after the nets are painted is to flat coat the tank. This will take care of any shiny spots the white glue have left on the tank.

That's it. A simple but realistic way to create camouflage nets.


