

 his is a review of Takom's 42cm (16-inch) M1917 Siege Howitzer. In 1/35th scale, this baby is BIG!





Southbound I-35 (from Austin/Round Rock/Waco):


- 1. Take exit 225 for Onion Creek Pkwy/FM1626.

- 4. Take the first left onto Farrah Lane.
- 5. Apartment clubhouse will be on the left.

Northbound I-35 (from Buda/San Marcos/SA):

- 1. Take exit 225 to merge onto southbound I-35 frontage road.
- 2. Turn left onto Onion Creek Pkwy.
- 3. Turn right onto Farrah Lane.
- 4. Apartment clubhouse will be on the right.


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going to be an easy project. Unfortunately, the parts did not align as cleanly as I had hoped. My friend Eric Choy noted that I used a fair amount of Gunze





"Mr. Surfacer" on the barrel and other components. Some of them were necessary to get rid of the seams, and some of them were there to fix my construction goofs. Yes, I'm old and out of practice!




The instructions in step 2 did not make it clear to me that the barrel and liner were to be installed clear through to the breach block. The instillation of the gun to the carriage gets a bit fiddly.


I was stunned with how easy the photo-etched rivet track went around the elevation transmission. Parts C-6 and C-7 can be built either open or closed. I chose closed. Parts B9 and B10 will probably require some filler after gluing. Again it was not clear to me, in step 5, as to which part the retainers were supposed to attach.







I was fortunate to have the book "Skoda Heavy Guns" by Michal Prášil that describes the 25cm, 38cm and 42cm howitzer. With this reference many questions as to placement of parts were answered.



I wish I had the skill of Bob Bethea or Eric Choy to properly paint the supplied figure to give the model a sense of scale. Remember this is a 16-inch gun, the same caliber as those on an lowa-class battleship!




I guess because I use enamels I didn't prime the model prior to painting. I painted an overall dark German Gray. Then I panel-faded the model as a preliminary weathering effect. A coat of acrylic clear was used to seal the enamels in before applying a dot system of filters with yellow, blue, black, and burnt umber artist oil paints. Finally I used MiG Pigments to simulate dust and dirt on the base plate.




Despite some engineering flaws and confusing instructions, this is a great kit for first time artillery modeler. You can't get any bigger than this for a howitzer or gun in $1/35^{\text{th}}$ scale, unless you want to tackle SoarArt's 80cm "Dora" Railway gun!!!
