A Cracking Oldie

ver 900 of the 1084 Lend-Lease British Matilda II Infantry tanks reached the Soviet Union during WWII. Although slow and lightly armed, the Soviet tankers appreciated the heavy armor and the diesel powered Leyland engines. Matildas played a major role in stopping the German advances during the defense of Moscow as the Red Army lost a large number of tanks in the summer of 1941.

By 1943, most Matildas had been withdrawn from frontline service. A few resources reported some saw



action late in the war against the Japanese in the Far East on the Manchurian front.

The Kit

No, my Red Army Matilda is not the latest release (35355) from Tamiya. In fact, it is the "vintage edition" from 1973, and technically it isn't really mine! It came



from **Bob Bethea**'s built-but-not-yet-painted stash. How I ended up with it was a mystery to me.

Since Bob did most of the hard work already, the only addition to the model that I can claim credit for is the spare track racks on the fenders. Tamiya mold the tracks and racks in one piece, and it looked chunky and inaccurate. So I sanded off the rack rails and scratchbuilt new ones with staples for wood work. On the left fender I only used one track link and slightly bended one of the rails to show signs of abuses in the field.




Painting

The base color, Khaki Green No.3, was a mixture of Tamiya XF-62 Oliver Drab (8 parts), XF-59 Desert Yellow (3 parts), and XF-68 NATO Brown (1 part). For highlights I just reduced the amount of XF-62 to a third. The "rubber band" tracks were painted with Tamiya XF-84 Dark Iron.

Decals

When Lend-Lease Matildas arrived in the Soviet Union, they had various instructional markings, including red stripes running the length of the tank to



signify maximum fording depths and anti-freeze drainage warnings. Echelon makes a set of decals (352018) that has all the mentioned markings, so I promptly order one from Sprue Brothers Models LLC. Even though the decals were designed for the new Tamiya

Matilda kit, they went on my model without any trouble.



Weathering

Most of the weathering I did were concentrated on the exhaust system of the tank. I applied artist oils with various shades of rust pigments to simulate the aging and dirty look of the muffler and the tubing on engine deck. The technique I used is well documented in Joaquin Garcia Gazquez's book Mastering Oils (Abteilung 502).



To tone down the whites of the WD number and various warning labels, I sprayed a very light coat of XF-62 over the decals. I also used the "sponge" method to break up the red stripes to show a few chippings here and there.

Some time back I smuggled a dozen of Tamiya Flat Clear (TS-80) spray cans across the border from



Canada, and I was eager to give one a try on this project. Unfortunately, I failed to remember the

cardinal rule of mixing lacquer and acrylic and did not give my waterbased paints enough time to cure before spraying the clear coat. I ended up with cracks in my paint job all over the model! Lesson learned here: a) no more illegal importing of Tamiya rattle cans, and b) allow at least a week for the acrylics to cure completely before applying any lacquer product on top!





Afterthoughts

If you want to build a proper Red Army Matilda, Tamiya's latest release (see boxart below) is probably a better bet for you. I chose the 40+ years old kit mainly to practice painting and weathering

techniques. Even though the final flat coat almost ruined my model, this oldie is still a *cracking* goodie in my books.

Our seminars connect you with experts in the field that will inspire you to finish that stalled project. Enjoy presentations on military vehicle history and research.


Modeling vendors come from all over the U.S. and abroad so you will no doubt find that book, accessory or model you've been looking for.

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
