reetings! By the time this newsletter goes into print, the 2019 Houston show will be in the books. Eric will have, if all goes according to plan, entered the AABS Sherman collection into that contest. As I am writing this, I wish us all success in the competition. Yet, win or lose, it was a worthy project and a tribute to the tank that helped the Allies win World War II.

We have some rain in the forecast so I hope that does not adversely affect the Houston show. My first time at that show it rained hard during the awards presentation. Susan and I thought we might have to find out if we were still good swimmers.

As I wrote last month the fighting in Italy had turned into stalemate. In May, however, that began to change. The II Polish Corps under General Anders, assaulted the German lines in what would be known as the fourth and final battle of Monte Cassino.



The first effort was repulsed by the Germans. Then the situation changed dramatically after Moroccan Goumiers outflanked the defensive line by advancing through terrain the Germans thought was impossible to traverse. From the newly acquired positions, the Goumiers, reinforced by other Moroccan and Algerian troops, were able to support British forces that were now threatening to cut the German supply and communication lines.



The Poles again pressed towards the now destroyed Abbey. In spite of intense mortar fires that inflicted heavy casualties, the Poles prevailed. The Abbey was taken as was the high ground around Monte Cassino. The Germans fell back to a new defensive position (the Hitler Line).

The Poles had succeeded where allies from several other national combat formations had failed. But of course, the cost had been very high.

As the fight for Monte Cassino was ending, allied forces began breaking out of the Anzio beachhead. It was the plan of Field Marshall Alexander that the allies would now be able to surround and trap the main German forces in Italy. American General Mark Clark, however, had his own plans that we will mention next month.

across a resin conversion by the Russian company **Komplekt Zip** that was available via Hobby Easy (hobbyeasy.com). I immediately placed an order of the sloped hull and a forged turret.

Construction

When the package arrived, I started test fitting the resin hull top onto the lower hull parts of a Hobby Boss T-26. The parts did not align very well at all, and I figured the conversion parts must have been based on an older T-26 kit. I happened to have a partially assembled/abandoned build of an old Italeri/Zvezda T-26. Parts alignment with the Italeri kit was much better, so I decided to use that kit as the base for the conversion.

Once I had trimmed down the top of the Italeri hull sides, the resin hull top was an easy fit. The lower hull top fit was not too bad; I just needed to add a plastic strip at the front of the hull, and I was good to go. The resin turret assembly was very straight forward. It consisted of just gluing parts together. I did opt for a turned 45mm barrel over the resin one provided by Komplekt Zip. To finish the build, I had to raid my spare parts box for some old T-26 parts. I added a saw, armored head light cover, horn, and a few other minor items.

Painting

My inspiration was based on three color profiles and two real pictures of a unique camouflage scheme used by a Soviet armored unit that participated in the joint British-Soviet invasion of Persia (Iran) that occurred in 1941.




I started by spraying a base coat of Tamiya XF-64 Field Grey (represents 4B0). Then I masked and sprayed unit identification stripes in Tamiya XF-2 Flat White on the turret top. Next, I sprayed AK Realcolors 6K Dark Brown in medium wavy stripes across the hull. Then I finished up with some handed painted thin wavy stripes in AK Realcolors 7K Sand.

I am happy with how this project turned out.



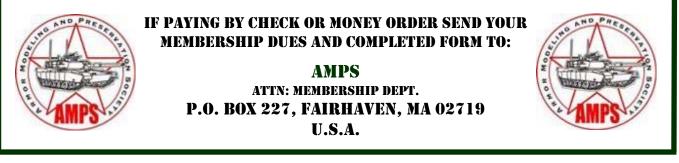

Known for their braille scale (1/72nd) products, Modelcollect surprises us all with a new Panther II E-50 in 1/35th scale.


Also new from Modelcollect is their 1/72nd R17 "Scud-B" ballistic missile on a 9P117M1 Launcher.
