# Testing Mission Models Acrylic Paints

eriodically manufacturers will come out with new formulations of paints to convince you to throw out the tried-and-true paints that you are using and buy a whole new set of theirs. Lately the modelling community has been all a flutter about Mission Models new line of paints. So I decided to do a simple comparison test with Tamiya and AK Interactive acrylics.

Since I use an airbrush for 99% of my painting, my test was done with an airbrush. The paints were thinned with Mission Models' dedicated thinner.



I chose two colors, *Dunkelgelb* (MMP-011) and U.S. Desert Tan Modern 2

(MMP-038), for color accuracy and paint durability. Dunkelgelb is Mission Models' version of WWII German armor yellow, and Desert Tan Modern 2 is meant to replicate CARC Tan used by current U.S. Armed Forces on vehicles.



August was another month of heavy combat action 75 years ago. On the 8th, Michael Wittman fought

his last battle; the SS tank ace was killed in action along with the entire crew of Tiger I '007'.





In the Pacific Theater of Operations, U.S. forces retook Guam from the Japanese. The 10<sup>th</sup> of August, 1944 marked the end of that operation.

On the 12<sup>th</sup> of August, the Battle of the Falaise Pocket began. The Allied offensive ended disastrously for the Germans nine days later. By then the Normandy campaign was effectively over with Germans forces in retreat (temporarily as it turned out).



The liberation of Paris also occurred in August of 1944. The battle began on the 19<sup>th</sup> and within a week General Dietrich von Choltitz, commander of the German garrison and military governor of Paris, surrendered to General Leclerc of the French 2<sup>nd</sup> Armored Division. Many of the actions and behind



the scenes decisions are recounted in Choltitz's memoir Brennt Paris? (Is Paris Burning?)



These are just some of the battles that occurred 75 years ago. A great many battles were being fought on the Eastern front and other places across the alobe.





I sprayed the colors in strips side by side to compare them. First let me say that Mission Models paints are very fragile, and they do not hold up well to masking. You can see from photo B where the paint lifted when I was masking for spraying the next


color. You can also see a scratch where my finger nail brushed against the paint (photo A). Let me reiterate: this paint is very fragile! Mission Models sells an automotive-grade Polyurethane Mix Additive (MMA-001) that makes its paints more durable. I strongly suggest you purchase the additive if you intend to invest in Mission Models' line of paints.

As we don't have Panzer III's and Panthers rolling around on the streets nowadays, I wasn't able to determine the accuracy of Mission Model's Dunkelgelb. However, I was able to match the US Desert Tan with photos of US vehicles in my research. In my opinion Mission Models' formulation is way off. The AK color is far closer to the real thing:

All in all, I find no reason to throw out my paints in the model closet. If it was significantly less expensive than AK or Tamiya, I might think about it. Unfortunately it is not the case and the fragility of the color coat makes it a no brainer. I'm not changing any time soon.
