his 1/35th Takom kit is one of those armor (armour?) kits that just sat on my shelves for several years as I couldn't get motivated to build until I noticed an on-line article about these beasts. More than 1,200 were built in England during WWI. Each weighed 28 tons, had a crew of eight, and came in three versions: "Male" with two six-pound cannons and up to six .303 caliber Lewis machine guns; the "Female" with no cannon (duh!) but carried the same number of Lewis MGs. The third version was used as an ammo carrier with a lot less armor and weapons.

The first action for these tanks occurred in November of 1917 during the Battle of Cambrai when 460 Mk.IVs overwhelmed the German trench system. Several Mk IVs remain today, including a Female "Liberty" being restored at Fort Benning, Georgia.


Construction

ell, we made it to June. Each day the outside temperature continues to rise. That is a good reason to stay inside and build models!

On June 4 1915, during the third Battle of Krithia, British, French, and Indian forces made a third and last attempt to capture Achi Baba, the main position for



Ottoman defenses on the Gallipoli Peninsula but were beaten back, sustaining some 6,500 casualties. Ottoman casualties were even higher, ranging between 9,000 and 10,000 men.

On June 4 1940, Operation Dynamo ended with the overnight evacuation of 26,175 French troops. At 10:20a.m., the Germans occupied Dunkirk and captured 30–40,000 French troops.



In the British House of Commons, Prime Minister Winston Churchill made the famous speech commonly titled We shall fight on the beaches.



The Battle of Abbeville ended in German victory.

On June 4, 1945, two regiments of the U.S. 6th Marine Division landed on the Oruku Peninsula on Okinawa in an attempt to outflank the Japanese defensive positions.

steps. The body is first, and it's like building a mishappen box. After which, the top ends and various pieces are added. Not until step 13 do you begin assembly of the side "sponsons" to carry the tracks. Interestingly, once you assemble the interior chain and the gear drive on both sides, they will never be seen again when both halves of the sponson are put together!




Speaking of sponsons, there are 24 individual rollers that "fit" into the lower sponson on each side. I had to ream out the individual holes with my X-Acto knife to get the rollers to fit correctly.

At step 21, it's time to assemble the tracks to go around both sponsons. Fortunately, I bought Takom's "optional" working tracks that easily snapped together versus the gazillion-piece tracks that come

with the kit. These optional track links actually work! Apparently Tamiya released a motorized version of this tank that used similar method to promote the kit.



Step 34 takes you to assemble the two six-pounder guns as well as the Lewis machine guns. Again, once



the side weapon blisters are assembled, the detail of the guns is almost zero, But at least you get to see what a WWI six-pounder looks like!



Painting & Weathering

Now that the model was basically put together, I went on-line for color and paint schemes, which included captured Mk.IVs (supposedly the Germans captured 40 or more and re-gunned many with their own multi-color camo schemes). Lots of color shots but some were obviously not correct. I wanted my Mk IV to be one of the first at the Battle of Cambrai in the basic mustard/brown/drab with the red and white British flashes on the bows.

I primed the tank with Tamiya gray primer. Next, I mixed my special Tamiya colors of Red Brown (XF-64) and Flat Earth (XF-52) to get close to the shade I needed. I used Vallejo washes for the sides with Vallejo mud and sand to distress the bottom of the tank. AK dirt and mud were used for the tracks which were painted a dark steel color prior to weathering.





Lastly, I came back with my airbrush to dust the top and upper sides with very light Vallejo Iraqi Sand.



Groundwork and Figures

Next was the base for this Mk IV, which was to be in the first tank assault at the Battle of Cambrai. I used foam with a bit of elevation to the corner and a German trench cut into the foam. I then placed everything into an old picture frame that was painted to match the base.




To add to the scene, I dug a small shell crater as well as added two twigs for small trees which I splintered as if they were hit by artillery. The drama of the scene is two German soldiers running for their lives out of the trench. They were originally WWII German figures from Nimrod that I converted by reshaping the officer's hat to an WWI enlisted cap and placing a $1/32^{nd}$ helmet on the other as *Stahlhelm* used in The Great War looks larger. Hornet heads were used to heighten the drama. Uniforms were painted with maroon piping and natural leather ammo pouches and belts.





Coda

This is a fun build, and the kit went together fairly well. The diorama scene was a last minute decision, but I think it works to tell a story. While I understand the terror confronting those two German soldiers running out of their trench, I can't imagine the noise, the heat, the smoke, and the fear of those eight Brits




CHECK YOUR SPARE PARTS BOX!
